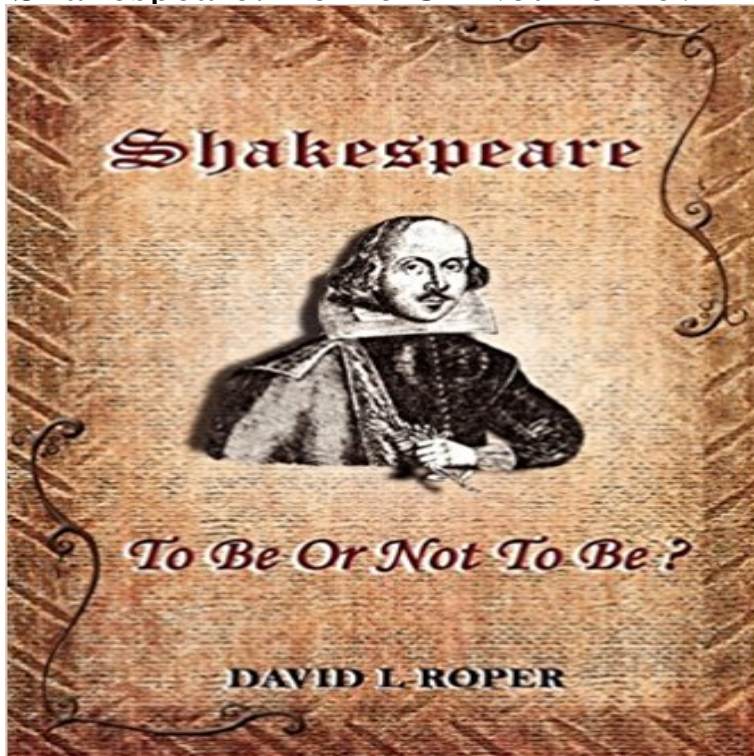


Shakespeare: To Be Or Not To Be?
